ASQ Certification

I continue to receive a large volume of email concerning preparing for a certification exam and the resources available. To ensure everyone gets a chance to see the opportunities available for certification training, we have decided to repeat the education corner from the last newsletter.

In this column, I will provide you with answers to the most often asked questions. The first of these is who provides training and where can I go to find out when and where this training is offered. The first source to consider for certification training is ASQ National. ASQ National lists all of their training courses and schedules on their ASQ Learning Institute web site: http://www.asq.org/learninginstitute/ or simply go to the ASQ web site and navigate to the Learning Institute. This site not only allows you to view and select courses to take; it also allows you to track your training history and plan your training. ASO offers classroom, webinars and individual courses that you can take to study for a certification exam. The downside to an ASQ National

course is the expense. There are other organizations that teach certification courses. We are unable to comment on these, as we do not know the quality of their courses. The next resource is local ASQ sections such as Section 0511. In the past, we have taught CQA, CSQE and CMQ/OE. We currently only offer the CQA course, as our instructors in the other courses are unable to devote time to teach the course. We will send an e-mail out announcing the start of a CQA course approximately one month in advance. We will also post it to our web page. Other sections also offer courses. The nearest sections are Section 0509 (Washington DC http://www.asq509.org/) and Section 502 (Baltimore http://www.asqbaltimore.org/). Finally, you can prepare for the exam by individual study. If you plan to do that, we recommend that you use the Quality Council of Indiana primers and study material (http://www.qualitycouncil.com/). I used the CQI primers to prepare for the Six Sigma Green Belt exam and passed on the first try. Finally, the only way to pass a certification exam is through long hard hours of preparation, no matter what method you choose!

Quality Education

While ASQ certifications are a great way to gain expertise and formal recognition, there are other venues that provide education in quality subjects. We recommend you check out the local institutions of higher learning. Almost all of them offer degrees in management with instruction on quality included in the courses offered. Others offer degrees in software engineering, manufacturing, etc. that closely align with the ASQ certification categories. Students can take individual courses or complete a degree program to gain more knowledge of the subject area and quality principles. Check out the web sites of the local colleges and universities to discover how they can help you become more professional.

VOLUNTEERS SOUGHT:

Education Volunteer: – In the past, the Section 0511 Education Chair has been concerned with providing training for section members who are trying to prepare for a certification exam. The section would like to expand our education role by moving into the Quality Education arena. We are looking for people who work in the Education field (any level, public/private, teacher or administrator) who would like to assist the section in providing liaison to local schools, setting up and running an Education Special Interest Group, etc. Qualified candidates should have a certification in one of the following areas: CMQ/OE, Quality Auditor, Six Sigma Black Belt, or Quality Improvement Associate. Certification Exam Preparation Course

Chapter Member Authors Book

We caught up with chapter member Jim Bowie to discuss his forthcoming book from ASQ Press, "Lean Acres". Jim grew up in Poolesville, MD, surrounded by farms. As a continuous process improvement consultant, Jim often drew examples from farm life to explain organizational improvement and quality management concepts to clients. One day he was struck with the inspiration to compile and expand these examples into a full-length book. His intent was to illustrate the strategic integration of several methodologies such as Lean, Six Sigma, Theory of Constraints and Business Process Reengineering in an entertaining, understandable manner that would be accessible and appealing to people who are

put off by a "guru on the mountain" academic approach.

"Lean Acres" is a fable about how a colorful collection of people and animals living on the farm approach their daily work and deal with competition and the need to change. Its central message is the criticality of personalities and the human element in successfully using and integrating quality methodologies, and that all groups, from churches to multi-national organizations, need to consider this. Jim makes the point that we need to recognize the "voice of the enemy" as well as the "voice of the customer". The competition is always watching what we do and using it to their advantage. Complacency is dangerous.

When asked if he had a favorite character, Jim chuckled and said "The interactions between Owl and the Jackass were fun to write. They represent two extremes – the Owl is knowledgeable and objective, and the Jackass is cemented in place. Everyone who reads this will recognize an Owl and a Jackass, but nobody is just one of the animals - we are ALL of the characters on the farm sometime!"
